### 11-21-11 recall rally

MADISON, Wis. (AP)—A rally supporting efforts to recall Governor Scott Walker has drawn tens of thousands of marchers to Madison. Capitol police estimate 25,000 to 30,000 people marched through the cold drizzle Saturday. Walker has been targeted by critics angry about the new limits his administration imposed on the collective-bargaining powers of public workers. When asked about the rally, a Walker spokesman said that Walker's only focus is on job creation. U.S. Rep. Tammy Baldwin, a Democratic candidate for the U.S. Senate, was at the march. So was former Democratic U.S. Sen. Russ Feingold, who appeared at a morning strategy session for volunteers. Although they chanted for him to run for governor, he reiterated that he'd stay out of the race.

### 11-21-11 deer hunt

MADISON, Wis. (AP)—State wildlife officials say this year's gun-deer hunt got off to a promising start, with hunters bringing in a steady stream of bucks and does throughout the day. The state Department of Natural Resources says no hunting injuries had been reported as of Saturday afternoon. The DNR says nearly 604,000 licenses had been sold Friday. That's about 4,000 fewer than were sold last year, but this year's number is expected to rise as license sales continue throughout the season. DNR officials say the early harvest results were strong, but things started to slow about 2 p.m. as a mix of rain, sleet and snow passed through north-central Wisconsin. The DNR predicts that weather conditions Sunday will be "nearly ideal," perhaps including fresh snow.

### 11-21-11 fox lake prison escapee

28 year old Christopher W. Lacourciere is reported as an escapee from the Fox Lake Correctional Institution. Lacourciere was working on the prison farm east of Waupun and was last seen at approximately 6:30pm 11-18-2011. Lacourciere is from the Cambridge area and is currently serving a prison term for 3rd degree sexual assault. Lacourciere is described as being a white male, 6ft tall, 170lbs, brown eyes and brown hair. **11-21-11 anderson will not fight extradition**

A Fond du Lac man suspected in the shooting death of his wife will not fight extradition in Alabama and is expected to return to Wisconsin this week or next. Jason Anderson faces a charge of first degree intentional homicide in the shooting death of his wife Nicole Anderson at their Winnebago Drive home this month. Investigators were able to track Anderson to Birmingham, Alabama after he used a debit card. He was arrested at a motel near Birmingham. Police Captain Steve Klein says Anderson has admitted he is responsible for his wife's death.

**11-21-11 road closure**

County Highway VV (Hickory Street) from County Highway W (Pioneer Road) to Military Road in the City of Fond du Lac will be closed Wednesday, November 16 until Monday, November 21 for construction, weather permitting. Crews will be placing concrete pavement and allowing the concrete to cure to complete repairs of the road after the Canadian National Railway removed the railroad crossing recently. A detour will be posted.

**11-21-11 marian university homeland security symposium**

Marian University's Institute for Homeland Security and Emergency Preparedness is hosting the Third Annual Homeland Security Symposium on Tuesday, December 6 from 8:30 a.m. - 4:15 p.m. at Whispering Springs Golf Club in Fond du Lac. This year's theme is "Building Community Resilience: A Practical Approach" and the keynote speaker will be Major General Warren Edwards (Ret), director of the Community and Regional Resilience Institute (CARRI) in Oak Ridge, Tennessee. The mission of CARRI is to develop and share critical paths communities may take to strengthen their ability to prepare for, respond to, and rapidly recover from significant man-made or natural disasters with minimal downtime of basic community, government, and business services. CARRI supports communities in their resilience building efforts and works with state, regional and national stakeholders to create incentives and support for community resilience. A discussion, featuring a panel consisting of Governor Scott McCallum, Nadav Morag, Ph.D., Naval Postgraduate School, Rick Meyers, Colorado Springs Police Department along with former Milwaukee Fire Chief, Doug Holton, currently the associate dean of Human and Protective Services at Madison Area Technical College is scheduled. Dr. Michelle Majewski, Dean of the School of Criminal Justice and Director of Marian's Institute for Homeland Security and Emergency Preparedness states, "We are especially pleased to be able to bring such a distinguished group of professionals to Fond du Lac for this year's symposium. This is an opportunity for interested individuals to learn more about community resiliency and the work being done on this topic. One of the goals of this symposium is to assist individuals with identifying concrete steps toward helping their respective community assess the level of resilience and to put a plan in place for enhancing community resiliency." **11-21-11 leaf collection**

The City of Fond du Lac's annual leaf collection will begin on Monday October 17, 2010 with crews starting in the northeast section of the city. The collection will proceed in a clockwise direction – to the southeast, southwest, and northwest sections. The leaf collection process will continue for six weeks, ending on Friday, November 25. Again this year there will be a map available on the City's website indicating the progress that collection crews have made to date. On the website, click on Leaf Collection Progress Map, and you can see which areas have been covered by collection crews, and arrows indicating in which direction the crews will be moving. The map will be updated toward the end of each work day. A sample of the map is available now at <http://www.ci.fond-du-lac.wi.us/>. For collection purposes, Main Street divides the city into east and west halves, and Western Avenue and Fourth Street divide the city into north and south halves. The Public Works Department anticipates that crews will complete approximately two clockwise sweeps through the city this fall, weather and time permitting. During the first round of collection, raking by the crew is limited. As an alternative to the collection, residents may haul their leaves to the City's yard waste drop off site located on the north side of the Municipal Service Center located at 530 Doty Street. Bags must be emptied and disposed of properly at the site.

• Leaves should be raked in rows next to the curb for collection by City crews. Please do not rake

leaves into the street.

- City crews will not pick up leaves in plastic bags.
- Park vehicles and garbage carts away from leaf windrows.
- Your garbage cart is for garbage only. Please do not place leaves inside the automated garbage collection carts.
- Cut garden material such as vines and corn stalks into lengths of one foot or less.
- Fruit and vegetables (such as apples or pumpkins) will not be collected. These should be disposed of at the City's yard waste drop off site on Doty Street. Some streets are still under construction at this time.

City crews will make every effort to get in to those areas still under construction, or will make a thorough cleanup later in the season after the construction is completed.

**A Green Alternative: Leave 'em Lay!**

As an alternative to raking leaves to the curb, residents are encouraged to try chopping up moderate amounts of leaves with a lawnmower. This can be done during normal lawn mowing. Just don't allow the leaves to mat and make sure that ample grass shows through them. This will save you work and time, add nutrients to your lawn, reduce windblown leaves in your neighborhood and reduce the amount of labor and fuel the City needs to use for leaf collection. If you really like to rake, composting your leaves in a backyard garden is another alternative which will provide you with useful organic material next year. Anyone who wishes to receive full seven cubic yard loads of leaves should contact the Municipal Service Center at 322-3544.

**11-21-11 winter parking restrictions**

The City of Fond du Lac Police Department and the Department of Public Works is taking this opportunity to remind the members of the community that the **WINTER PARKING RESTRICTIONS** are now in effect. Parking from November 15th to March 15th is restricted between the hours of 8:00 p.m. to 8:00 a.m. **On EVEN NUMBERED DAYS**, starting at 8:00 p.m. parking is restricted to the EVEN side of the street. **On ODD NUMBERED DAYS**, starting at 8:00 p.m. parking is restricted to the ODD side of the street. Any **METERED AREA** is still restricted to 60 minutes between the hours of 2:00 a.m. and 6:00 a.m. This ordinance overrides all other on-street parking restrictions where parking is allowed. Please remind family, friends and overnight guests of these restrictions as violations can be costly. Thank you for your cooperation. **11-21-11 fdl county sheriff's department law of the month**

Although the official start of winter this year is not until December 22, Wisconsin likely will be hit with the usual onslaught of ice, snow, and limited visibility that makes driving difficult-if not impossible-at times. To survive treacherous winter driving conditions, motorists must be patient and follow common-sense precautions. When there's ice or snow, many motorists skid off the road or crash because they were driving too fast for conditions. The posted speed limits are for dry pavement, and those speeds may be hazardous when roads are slick. The slogan 'Snow Means Slow' also applies to four-wheel drive and other heavy duty vehicles, which need ample distance for stopping on slippery roads, just like other vehicles. Citation for driving too fast for conditions Wis.Stat.346.57(3) costs \$213.10 with four demerit points. Winter weather also can limit visibility, so drivers must remove all frost, ice and snow from their vehicle's windows. You must be able to see in all directions at all times to avoid crashes. Clearing only a small patch on a windshield or rear window is not sufficient. Clearing snow and ice from the lights, hood and roof also helps improve visibility and safety. According to state law, a vehicle's windshield, side wings, and side and rear windows must be kept clear at all times Wis.Stat. 346.88(4). Violating this law costs \$175.30 with two demerit points assessed on the driver's record. During severe winter storms, the wisest decision often is to stay put and not drive. Our officers frequently respond to vehicles in the ditch and chain-reaction crashes when there was no real need for the drivers to be on the road at all. Slowed or stalled traffic on slippery roads also delays snowplows and tow trucks that are trying to get the roads cleared. To minimize the dangers of winter driving follow these safety tips:

**Always** wear your seat belt even if traveling a short distance. You and your passengers absolutely need this protection even in low speed "fender-bender" collisions.

**Watch** for slippery bridge decks. They ice up quicker than adjacent pavement.
