11-30-11 armed robbery-briarcrest apartments

On 11-30-11 at about 3:47 a.m., Fond du Lac Police were called to a parking lot at the Briarcrest Apartments at N. Seymour and W. Arndt Streets for a report of an armed robbery that had occurred. The victim, a 28-year old Fond du Lac man, told officers that he was approached by two subjects described as white males. Both males allegedly displayed handguns and demanded a ride from the victim. After the victim refused to give the subjects a ride, one of the suspects took some items from the victim's wallet and fled the area on foot. The victim was not injured. Both suspects were described as being in their late teens or early twenties dressed in all black and also wearing bandanas. No suspects are in custody at this time. 11-30-11 tavern robbery suspects make initial court appearance

Two suspects in a Van Dyne tavern robbery have officially made their initial Fond du Lac court appearance a week after they were arrested. Amanda Verbanac and her sister Nicole Schneider are charged with armed robbery, battery and armed burglary. They are being held in jail on \$50,000 cash bail. A criminal complaint alleges that factors in the robbery included making a house payment and prescription drug abuse. Sheriff's Lieutenant, Cameron McGee, says Verbanac's husband had reported Tuesday afternoon that robbers entered their house and stole prescription medication.

11-30-11 "body" found in lake winnebago turns out to be a mannequin

Fond du Lac police are not laughing at what appears to be a sick joke played by someone at Lakeside Park. Police captain Steve Klein says police received a call shortly before 1pm Wednesday from a person who spotted what he thought was a body floating in Lake Winnebago off Frazier Point. Klein says it turns out the object was a mannequin. "Somebody had taken some old clothing and stuffed the clothing with newspapers," Klein said. Klein says what may be a joke to someone is something that's taken very seriously by law enforcement and rescue personnel.

11-30-11 iron ridge man arrested for 8th owi

On Tuesday, November 29, 2011 at 9:48pm Deputy Mke Willmann of the Dodge County Sheriff's Department observed a vehicle moving slowly in the parking lot of the Oasis Bar in the village of Rubicon. After accessing the DOT files, the deputy determined that the registered owner had at least 6 priors for OWI. The deputy then returned to the area to find that the vehicle had left the parking lot. hand turn nearly put the vehicle in the ditch. Deputy Willmann conducted a traffic stop and made contact with the driver who was identified as Dennis Grosenick, a 59 year old male who lives in the Iron Ridge area. After conducting standard field sobriety tests, it was determined that Mr. Grosenick was intoxicated. A preliminary breath test indicated he was nearly 3 times the normal legal limit. As this would be his 8th offence, his alcohol level was over 10 times the limit set for him. Grosenick is currently being held at the Dodge County Jail on charges of OVI 8th offence, open intoxicants, and violation of his probation. If convicted, he could be fined up to \$25,000.00 and serve up to 10 years in prison.

11-30-11 four injured in multiple vehicle crash on hwy 26

A four vehicle accident on Highway 26 in Fond du lac County sent four people to the hospital...two with serious but non life threatening injuries. Sheriff's Lieutenant Bill Tadych says at 5:02pm Tuesday the Sheriff's Department received a report of a reckless semi traveling northbound on 26 near Willow Creek Road. Three minutes later a caller reported a multiple vehicle crash on 26 just north of Hollander Drive in the town of Springvale. Tadych says the semi tractor struck two vehicles into a guardrail and later burst into flames. A fourth vehicle was southbound at the time of the second collision and received damage from flying debris. The sheriff's office is continuing its investigation including the possibility that the semi driver may have suffered a medical condition prior to the accident. The semi driver 62 year old, John Peckham, of Nekoosa received minor injuries. The driver of the first car, 53 year old, Jeffrey Theiss, of Appleton received minor injuries, but his passenger, 75 year old John Lehto of Appleton, received head injuries and was flown by helicopter to Theda Clark Medical Center. The driver of the second vehicle, 33 year old, Adam Auerbeck, of Oshkosh received serious leg and hip injuries and was flown by Flight for Life helicopter to Theda Clark Hospital. The driver of the third vehicle, 55 year old, Blaine Priesbusch, of Reeseville was not injured.

11-30-11 deer harvest up slightly over last year

MADISON, Wis. (AP) — State wildlife officials say hunters killed slightly more deer during this year's traditional gun hunt compared with last year. The Department of Natural Resources says preliminary estimates show hunters harvested more than 226,000 deer over the nine-day hunt that concluded Sunday.

11-30-11 fatal chemical spill investigation continues

The Dodge County Sheriff's Office says the chemicals involved in a fatal industrial accident were used in the projection screen manufacturing process. The incident happened Monday afternoon at Vivid Image near Theresa. Sheriff Todd Nehls says the chemicals have been identified as Toluene, Screen Coating Paint, and Paraloid B-48S. Nehls says five gallon containers of each substance were found tipped over and empty. Two workers in the plant were overcome by the fumes. Fifty five year old, Roman Torres, of Horicon was pronounced dead at the scene. Sixty five year old, Thomas Persha, of Horicon was transported to the hospital where his condition has improved. Nehls says the investigation into the spill continues.

11-30-11 cash bail set for sisters accused of robbing van dyne tavern

Bail has been set at \$50,000 cash each for two sisters who are accused of robbing a Van Dyne tavern. Judge Peter Grimm ordered the cash bond at a bail bond hearing in Fond du lac County Circuit Court Tuesday morning for 25 year old Amanda Verbanac and 19 year old Nicole Schneider. The judge noted the women had been sitting in jail since last Wednesday without making a court appearance. They are accused of robbing Cooligan's Tavern in Van Dyne earlier this month and beating the bartender over the head with a handgun and wooden garden hoe. Prosecuting attorney Scott Mortier told the court Verbanac needed money to make a house mortgage payment and because of an issue with drugs involving her husband. The pair is scheduled to officially make their initial appearance Wednesday. A preliminary hearing for both is scheduled for December 9th.

11-30-11 man sentenced for running down a deer with snowmobile

WAUPACA, Wis. (AP) — Arural Weyauwega man has been sentenced to eleven years in prison for running down and killing deer with a snowmobile. Rory Kuenzi (KIN'-zæ) will serve the sentence concurrently with the 23 years he is already serving for killing a pedestrian while driving drunk. He pleaded no contest to three counts of felony animal mistreatment in the 2009 deer deaths.

11-30-11 beaver dam man sentenced to prison for possession of child porn

A Beaver Dam man convicted on two counts of possession of child pornography is going to prison. Brandon Alexander was sentenced in Dodge County Circuit Court to three years in prison and four years of extended supervision and placed on probation for four years. Five counts were dismissed and read into the record.

11-30-11 private patient rooms at st agnes hospital

For the first time, private patient rooms will soon be available at Fond du Lac's Saint Agnes Hospital. Beginning in January Agnesian HealthCare will unveil the first of 57 private rooms under construction, Saint Agnes Executive Vice President, Steve Little, says the goal is to have all rooms become private, single-occupancy rooms and the project is the largest concerted effort to make it a reality. Vice President of Nursing, Jill Stenson, says from a nursing standpoint the changes mean faster, more efficient transmission of medical information to providers. Room amenities include large windows with natural light and upgraded decor, a conversion couch for overnight stays, spa-like custom tiled private bathroom and shower and a personal refrigerator in every room. The \$25 million project involves completion of three floors of private rooms in the south building as well as renovation of some rooms in the current patient building at St. Agnes Hospital. A public open house is scheduled from 10am to 1pm on Sunday, January 8th.

11-30-11 no salvation army bell ringers at fleet farm

WAUSAU, Wis. (AP) — Mills Fleet Farm has decided not to allow bell ringers from the Salvation Army to collect donations outside its stores. Co-President Stewart Mills Jr. says the company will make a donation to the charity, but that allowing bell ringers could open the floodgates to others who want to use the company's property.

11-30-11 911 abuse

The Dodge County Sheriff's Department says an incident this week is another reminder that 911 is a

number to be used for emergency situations only. Sheriff Todd Nehls says at 1:34 Monday morning a 35 year old woman dialed 911 to complain that her husband wanted to leave the bar and would not give her any money. Nehls says with well over 15,000 911 calls answered by the Dodge County dispatchers annually, unnecessary calls are a drain on resources and could slow an emergency response to those who really are in need and have emergencies. Nehls says so far this year the department has fielded 911 calls from people looking for trick or treat hours, hours at the local dump, as well as a young man calling to report his grandfather cheating at a game of cards. Inappropriate use of 911 may lead to a fine of more than \$300.

11-30-11 disabled youth hit the ice for hockey december 3rd

The Wisconsin Warriors Sled Hockey Team gives youth with disabilities the opportunity to play hockey. Started in 2007, the team now features about a dozen players from throughout Wisconsin and is always open to adding new players. The Wisconsin Warriors will take on the Waupun Bantams:

Parking from November 15th to March 15th is restricted between the hours of 8:00 p.m. to 8:00 a.m. **On EVEN NUMBERED DAYS**, starting at 8:00 p.m. parking is restricted to the EVEN side of the street. **On ODD NUMBERED DAYS**, starting at 8:00 p.m. parking is restricted to the ODD side of the street. Any **METERED AREA** is still restricted to 60 minutes between the hours of 2:00 a.m. and 6:00 a.m. This ordinance overrides all other on-street parking restrictions where parking is allowed. 11-30-11 fdl county sheriff's department law of the month

Although the official start of winter this year is not until December 22, Wisconsin likely will be hit with the usual onslaught of ice, snow, and limited visibility that makes driving difficult-if not impossible-at times. To survive treacherous winter driving conditions, motorists must be patient and follow common-sense precautions. When there's ice or snow, many motorists skid off the road or crash because they were driving too fast for conditions. The posted speed limits are for dry pavement, and those speeds may be hazardous when roads are slick. The slogan "Snow Means Slow" also applies to four-wheel drive and other heavy duty vehicles, which need ample distance for stopping on slippery roads, just like other vehicles. Acitation for driving too fast for conditions Wis.Stat.346.57(3) costs \$213.10 with four demerit points. Winter weather also can limit visibility, so drivers must remove all frost, ice and snow from their vehicle's windows. You must be able to see in all directions at all times to avoid crashes. Clearing only a small patch on a windshield or rear window is not sufficient. Clearing snow and ice from the lights, hood and roof also helps improve visibility and safety. According to state law, a vehicle's windshield, side wings, and side and rear windows must be kept clear at all times Wis.Stat. 346.88(4). Violating this law costs \$175.30 with two demerit points assessed on the driver's record. During severe winter storms, the wisest decision often is to stay put and not drive. Our officers frequently respond to vehicles in the ditch and chain-reaction crashes when there was no real need for the drivers to be on the road at all. Slowed or stalled traffic on slippery roads also delays snowplows and tow trucks that are trying to get the roads cleared. To minimize the dangers of winter driving follow these safety tips:

Always wear your seat belt even if traveling a short distance. You and your passengers absolutely need this protection even in low speed "fender-bender" collisions.

Watch for slippery bridge decks. They ice up quicker than adjacent pavement.

11-30-11 help stock the food pantry shelves

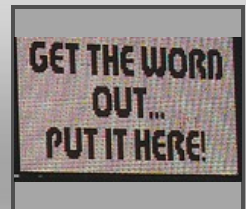
